



# County and Community Profile

### Yakima County

- High Hispanic Population 40%
- 125 out of 3,140 U.S. counties with most need for economic and educational reform
- Undereducated only 68% of adults has a high school education or better
- High unemployment over 10%
- High poverty 36.6% of adults over 65 live at or below poverty level
- Low income per capita income over \$10,000 below national average
- Young 38.4% of the population under 20 years of age

#### Grandview

- High Hispanic Population nearly 70%
- Undereducated only 23.2% have a high school diploma, 5.8% have a college degree
- High unemployment 12.5%
- High poverty 79% school children receive free or reduced lunch
- Economy reliant upon seasonal employment in agriculture and food processing


# Community Need

- Need educational opportunities that support economic development and a facility to house them
- Access to networked computers
- Access to reference materials, books, and electronic databases
- Professionally trained staff to assist with accessing resources
- Access to short-term training classes
- Resources accessible at no charge or for a nominal fee
- Resources available in English and Spanish
- Resources available day and night throughout the week
- Resources available locally

# Goals and Objectives for Activity I

- Year 1 and 2 of the grant
- 12,000 square-foot facility
- Accessible Design features
- Universal Design standards
- Energy efficient meet or exceed a LEED Silver Certification
- Equipped with accessible technology
- Space for library book stacks, audio-visual materials, reading areas, study rooms, computer carrels, a circulation desk, offices, staff workroom, and a multipurpose classroom





## Goals and Objectives for Activity II

- Year 3 of the grant
- Leverage partnerships to offer and financially support the workshops
- Target residents of Grandview, Sunnyside, Prosser, Mabton, and Granger Communities
- Seminars and support materials in English and Spanish
- Two types of seminars
  - Five focusing on business development topics
  - Four focusing on first-time home buying
  - Both will cover cost savings from Energy Star appliances and products

## **Status**

- Working jointly with city to raise \$2 million for a Washington State matching grant
  - HSIAC grant funds part of the \$2 million match
  - Raised over half of funds needed
  - Well on track to complete fundraising by June 2009
- Expanding network of partners for training efforts

# **Challenges Encountered**

- Raising capital funds, especially for a rural area
- Fundraising in a poor economy

# **Projected Outcomes**

- Activity I: Construct and Equip a Joint City/College Library
  - Construction of a joint city/college library
  - Incorporate Accessible Design features, Universal Design standards, and energy efficiency measures
- Activity II: Conduct Community Training Seminars
  - Complete of at least nine training seminars within a year after the new joint city/college library is completed
  - Business seminars will be train at least 50 participants representing at least 20 businesses
  - First-time home buying workshops will be train 60 participants
